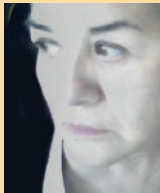
Scott Lucas

East, and North Africa as well as the US. Making the most of the opportunities offered by social media, the site is hoping to expand to provide news and analysis of areas such as Latin America and China.

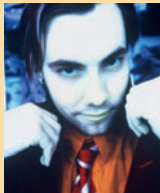
Anita Hunt

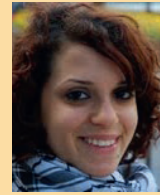
Slim Amamou

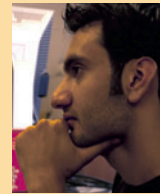
Salma Said

movement in 2005 when she discovered the Egyptian blogosphere. Salma is also an actress and has been working in the field of cultural management.

Hamza Fakhr



Hamza Fakher is currently the Communications Manager of London based Strategic Research and Communication Centre. The Centre provides research, analysis

and commentary on Syrian affairs to governments, academic institutions, and media outlets. Fakher also contributes to various international media outlets, such as Los Angeles Times, Voice of America, Daily Telegraph and Washington Post. During his stay in Syria before being forced to leave in July, Fakher was co-organizing demonstrations, providing a constant news stream from regime insiders, and coordinating entry of communications equipment to Syria.

Maryam Al-Khawaja



Maryam Al-Khawaja, from Bahrain, has played an instrumental role in the democratic protests taking place in the Pearl Roundabout in February, which

triggered a government response of widespread arrest, discrimination, and fear to suppress dissent and quell voices for reform.

Sultan Sooud Al Qassemi is a UAE based columnist whose columns have appeared in publications within and outside the Arab Gulf region. His columns have appeared in The Gulf News, The National Newspaper, The Financial Times, The Independent, The Guardian, The Huffington Post, Foreign Policy, Open Democracy, The Hindu, The Globe and Mail, Gulf Business and Arab News amongst others. Sultan Al Qassemi is also a non-resident Fellow at the Dubai School of Government.

Neal Mann



Neal Mann is a Sky News journalist who specializes in using social media to cover breaking news. Working on Sky News foreign desk Neal has covered many of the major news stories of the last year including most recently the war in Libya. He was recently described by the Guardian newspaper as being a 'Twitter Colossus' and sees social media as being as important a broadcasting platform as TV, radio or online.

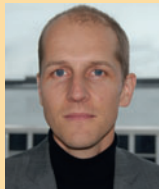
Dima Khatib



Dima Khatib is Palestinian-Syrian and was born in Damascus. She is working for Al Jazeera since 1997 as a news and programme producer and reporter. She has worked out of Qatar, Hong Kong, Beijing and since 2005 out of Venezuela as the Latin America Bureau Chief for Al Jazeera. She has represented Al Jazeera in over 20 countries around the world. She is the first and only female bureau chief in Al Jazeera Arabic, and first Arab reporter to seek a base in Latin America to report to the Arab World. She has been very active on Twitter covering Arab revolutions and was featured in Forbes Middle East Magazine as an influential Arab twitter-reporter.

Marcin de Kaminski is a sociologist and doctoral candidate at the Dep. of Sociology of Law at Lund University. His research focuses on social movements on

the Internet and the clash between legal and social norms on the net and away from keyboard. Marcin is also a long time net activist, currently involved in the pro internet think tank Juliagruppen (The Julia Group), and has been co-founder, coordinator and facilitator of many progressive projects and campaigns related to Internet freedom issues.
